August Demonstrator: Ron Gerton Strobe Light Turning August 14, 2014



ARTIST STATEMENT - RON GERTON

Ron Gerton is a retired mechanical engineer with over 30 years of experience in the nuclear field. He has always enjoyed creating art to keep life in focus. The Art Nouveau style, with its emphasis on natural forms and shapes is his favorite design inspiration. The Bonsai plant, skillfully trained to defy nature and gravity, is a classic example and heavily influences his work. He transforms things that he finds in nature, that are no longer living, into metal for incorporation into his art pieces. These "fossils" now have a permanence that can be enjoyed for generations.

To him, nature is the greatest creator of beauty and his challenge is to display it beautifully. Going "green" has long been a major factor in his art. Thrift stores abound with potential art materials. Cast off industrial materials is also a great source. The tens of thousands of small wood pieces from a laser cutting business and puzzle pieces from thrift stores are incorporated into his wood turnings and wall pieces. "Everything is a raw material for something else" is his motto.

## September Demonstrator: John Beaver Wave Bowels September 11, 2014



I enjoy including a certain "how did he do that?" factor into my pieces while staying true to good design. Having lived my entire life near the Pacific Ocean, the motion and rhythm of the ocean's waves are a major inspiration for my work. Contrast is also an important element for me, not only aesthetically but in the process of turning a functional object, like a bowl, into an "object d'art." Artistically, I like to combine multiple woods with dyes and textures to enhance the rhythmic lines that are a part of my work. The technical genesis of these works lies in my ability to deconstruct and reconstruct a turned vessel in a number of different ways while maintaining grain and wall alignment. I hope that my pieces will evoke a feeling of movement and energy in an otherwise static environment.

While the focus of my demonstration is on my unique "wave" technique, my goal is for the audience to see a lot of tips and tricks that can be applied to their own designs. The genesis of my work comes from the ability to deconstruct and reconstruct a turned vessel in a number of different ways while maintaining grain and wall alignment. The advantage of my technique is it allows the turner to begin with wet logs and still build constructed turnings.

### Lumber to Legacy: Wood Artisans Needed.

A Benefit for the City of Albany's White Oak Conservation and Restoration Effort: The city of Albany seeks to promote and raise money for its resource conservation efforts, in particular our Oregon White Oak Restoration Program. The purpose of the restoration program is to enhance existing oak habitat and to reestablish the species in publicly protected conservation areas through a strategic planting initiative and educational activities. The recent removal of 8 mature Oregon white oak trees from the site of a new development has inspired us to focus attention on the heritage of Albany's Oregon white oak (Quercus garryana) habitat. These 8 trees were remnants of the Hackleman Grove named in honor of Abner Hackleman, one of Albany's founding fathers. The Hacklemans settled on the edge of the grove in 1845. At that time several of the trees were already 100 years old. To raise money for white oak habitat restoration efforts, the Albany Parks & Recreation Department, in partnership with the Albany Tree Commission, is seeking wood artisans willing to work this historically precious wood into unique wood products and art for auction or resale. Both kiln dried and green wood are available for turners. All proceeds from this community driven volunteer effort will be used to enhance existing Oregon white oak habitat and to re-establish the species in publicly protected conservation areas. Some people have chosen to give more decorative bowls. That is great and I'm sure they will be very popular. Those bowls will used for an auction.

We will provide disposable bowls or liners for those nonfood friendly bowls. If you make a food safe bowl it would be great if you would let us know.

If you want to have any recognition for your work please feel free to include a card or bio to display along with your bowl or bowls. People who support events like this do like to know a little about the artist. They also like to know what the wood is. Include that information too if you can.

All the funds raised are to help a charity called Farmers ending Hunger. They partner with local food banks and help combat hunger in numerous ways. More information on their organization can be found on their website and will also be available at the event.

We will sell tickets in advance for how many soup bowls we have. Every ticket holder will have a keepsake bowl at the end of the evening. People without advance tickets can still come have a meal and join in the auction portion of the evening.

I have a stack of walnut blanks if anyone would like to turn another bowl or doesn't want the expense of buying a dry blank. Let me know and I will bring them to the next meeting.

Finally our event is scheduled for October 4th. We would be willing to move it one week later to October 10th. That would have the event after our October meeting instead of just before it. If this means that we can get significantly more bowls donated it will be worth it. We can take a count at our August meeting.
