Segmented Woodturning Part two

Cutting the segments

The segments can be cut in many different ways. Recently I saw a bowl where the segments had been cut with a pocket knife and sanded to shape. (Too much work for me) If you have a table saw and/or a Disk sander the cutting is very easy. It becomes just the accuracy that is the problem.

With a table saw you must build a "cutting sled". You can build an adjustable one, as I have, or build several of them with each one at a different angle. Go to "You Tube" and look at all of the different designs, and there are many. My preference is the one by "Gord Rock"; he is very clear and shows how to get a perfect angle. For this reason I will not go into the building of the sled.

As I said in the May Burl the segment is just like a board to build a house; the height is the size of the lumber $(\frac{3}{4})$ the width is determined by the required overlap of each ring as you build the height of the bowl. But always overlap the previous ring by $\frac{1}{4}$ of the width of the previous ring. This overlap is what allows you to design an attractive bowl shape.

The length of the segment is determined by the bowl diameter, and the number of segments in the ring. Let's run through this again for an 8" bowl: $8 \frac{1}{4} \times 3.14 = 25.9$ " (30") this extra ¹/₄" is needed for turning. With this known we decide on the number of segments in the ring, in our case 12. 30" divided by 12 = 2.5" in length.

Using a sled you can cut the segment angle at the same time as you cut the length. Adjust the guide bar to 15 degrees and adjust a "fixed" stop to 2.5" now cut segment. (Don't forget to account for the saw blade thickness.) You have now cut your first segment and it needs to be checked for accuracy. It is probably wrong but you can adjust things to correct it. Then cut a second segment and check it, it will be correct.

Once the segments are all cut you can assemble them into a ring, put pressure on the ring and examine the ring for a perfect fit. I use "Band" clamps to apply the pressure, but a heavy rubber band will work also. Check for space (light leaks) between the segments and correct the alignment as needed, (There cannot be any space between the segments or it will show in the bowl.) If you are going to add a design feature between the segments, now is the time to add it.

After the check they are ready to be glued together. I recommend "Titebond III", but you have to work fast. When the segments are together apply the clamp to them and press the ring flat. They can be flattened with a rubber mallet or a "ring press"; they just have to be flat, so as to a seamless fit with the next layer

Now repeat this process for each ring that you will need for the bowl. We will assemble the rings into a bowl next month... Have a good summer!!!
