Help Wanted

As we approach the midpoint of 2021, I've been looking ahead and thinking about what steps the club needs to take in the next six months. As always, a lot of the focus is on obtaining assistance from the membership to fill positions and do the work of the club. Here are some of our needs for the remainder of 2021 and into 2022.

Outreach coordinators: We could use some additional help coordinating our booths at State Fair and at Steam-Up this year and into the future. He fills a lot of other roles for the Club and for the Oregon Woodturning Symposium and has decided it's time for a break from this task. My Adventures at Woodturning

I was introduced to woodturning in 9th grade, where I turned a shallow bowl. And I still have it today. Fast forwarding 40+ years; I met a woodturner at the Edmonds, WA farmers market about 8 years ago and he inspired me to buy a lathe. Within a couple of years, I bought a 5 speed Delta midi lathe, a set of Sorby turning tools, and Richard Raffan's book "Turning Wood", which was recommended by a Rockler employee.



After reading parts of Richard's book to get started, I still had questions. What is the proper lathe speed? What does 'rub the bevel' mean? How high to set the tool rest? How to sharpen turning tools properly? When to re-sharpen the tools? I purchased a Tormek-like system from Grizzly for sharpening my tools.

I tried to locate a wood turning club near me, but according to AAW there wasn't a club anywhere near me (within 1+ hour). Then I bought Richard Raffan's video and tried to imitate his methods. I thought how hard can it be? I also checked out You Tube. Yikes! There are a lot of videos online! Learning was slow at first as I had a full time job and a long commute. I could only turn every couple of weeks.

My first few projects were spindle turning: a bottle opener, a spinning top, and a Christmas ornament from Wood Magazine (Nov 2010). The first two I used the roughing and spindle gouges. It went OK, but I was thankful for sandpaper! Then I tried the Christmas ornament with a skew chisel as the article recommended. Here it goes... I got a catch... Then another one. And another one. After couple of ornaments, I was ready to toss the skew in the garbage (or throw it across the garage). Instead, I went back to the roughing and spindle gouges, sandpaper, re-reading Richard's book, and videos online. I eventually learned how to use the skew through trial and error (and lots of catches).

I moved on to bowls and boxes. For my wife I made a small box. I tried to use a 3/4 inch square end scraper to howl out the inside. However, it wasn't cutting so I pushed a little harder. It was now burning and creating dust. I sharpened it and tried again. Still the same result. Hmm... Back to the books and videos. Finally, I raised the tool rest and (Wa-lah!) that worked! Not knowing how fast to turn, I started at about 950 - 1550 rpms for small projects. I didn't reduce the speed of the lathe before sanding, so some projects (e.g., bowls) developed cracks due to the heat generated by sanding. Of course, I sanded too hard and too long. Another learning experience.

Based on Mike Mahoney's Fine Woodworking article (Jan/Feb 2017 a lidded canister), I made an urn for our Beagle that died of cancer. It was quite the learning experience with my bowl gouge. After finishing the outside, I move to the inside. It was going well, until I had a bad catch that exploded the top part of the canister. Good thing I heeded woodturning safety warning and was wearing my face shield. Otherwise, I would have been hit in the face.

I also took a class from the Woodcraft in Seattle. The instructor spend the vast majority of his time with the only other class member who never turned. I didn't learn much at all. I also took a sharpening class (from a different instructor) and that was a little better. I then purchased the Oneway Wolverine system, 8 inch grinder, and CBN wheels. I now use my Grizzly slow speed grinder for sharpening kitchen knives.

Mike Mahoney has been a professional woodturner since 1994. His bowls are featured in galleries across the United States. Mike's work is sought after by collectors all over the world. Mike is often requested to demonstrate and teach for woodturning clubs, craft schools, and symposia. He has traveled around the world to discuss and demonstrate his craft and is considered an authority in woodturning.

As you can imagine, Mike produces a lot of bowls and other turnings but he also produces enormous piles of wood shavings.

Artist Statement:

"I am passionate about my craft and the American Craft movement. I am dedicated to producing quality craft and educating the public about woodturning. My wood comes from urban sources (tree trimmers and local cities). I produce all my work on the lathe without any embellishments after the fact, creating a very traditional feel with contemporary ideas. I want my work to be attractive as well as useful. For my work to be admired is one thing, but for my work to be used fulfills my purpose as a craftsman."

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Membership Rewards

Chain Sharpening Service from Jeff Zens: I have an electric chain sharpener and can accurately sharpen your chains and adjust depth stops for your saw chains. This service will restore the chain to “factory-new” condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00. Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is only available for club members.

Supplies

The club purchases a few supplies in bulk and sells them to members at club cost. We routinely have superglue (\$5), black or brown superglue (\$10) accelerator (\$10). Additionally, the club has a small supply of half round protractors (\$6) used to measure the angle ground on a tool, and depth gauges (\$5). HSS Round Tool Bits rods (1/4" x 8") are also available (\$3). These are available at club meetings: see Jerry Lelack at the meeting to purchase. Anchorseal (\$9/gal) and walnut oil (\$20/gal) are available through Jeff Zens. You will need to bring your own gallon containers; contact [Jeff](#) to make arrangements.
