#### January President's Message:

# **Notes from December club meeting:**

**President Marc Vickery** gavelled the meeting to order at 6:30 with 50 people in attendance and followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Josh:** Looking for volunteers to teach wood turning to Vets in Salem area

Mark C: Beads of Courage call

Pres Marc: Show 'n Tell format discussion-asked for input on how this time goes

- -some like brief comments about pieces; others wish to allow members to look on their own
- -suggestion to put pieces on separate tables-one to be discussed; the other not
- -in end, folks seemed to like light comments and that they were done in time for 7PM demonstrator start time.

Warren: looking for Drill Wizard

**Marc:** small group collected a load of eucalyptus and laurel wood and gifted it to the group to be picked up during the break. Asked that a small \$ donation be given by those picking up some wood.



#### **Demonstrator: Roy Alvarez-platter**

\*some notes\*

Roy began with some of his history and discussed some theories of teaching he uses to guide him

Platter vs bowl: the main difference is a bowl has no straight surfaces and is designed to "float" off floor

Platter wood choice: likes to get closer to heartwood for the better/more interesting color

\*Base of platter\*

Roy likes to use a faceplate to begin

-reminded us to use good screws (not drywall)

-match the screw type to plate (pan head or

### countersunk)

-screw lathe into plate for better control

-cut toward headstock (very secure/no tailstock needed)

Lathe start up: always be aware of speed setting (told story of starting up lathe with large blank on it after a spindle turner demo-piece went flying!)

Roy used the tool rest to draw a line from the center out to use as an aid to place tool rest at ideal height.



Grinding tip: Roy sees wings get very thin resulting in short lived holding of an edge

Roy spent some time discussing flute shapes including the V, parabolic, and U shapes (prefers parabolic)

Cutting angle: Roy teaches to open flute to between 1 and 2 o'clock

Roy demonstrated shear cutting to true the face of the wood

-right foot forward, pull from wood center toward edge

-handle is steeply down and wing is used to cut

-looks at far side of piece for shaping/must feel the wing bevel and edge

True the outside with controlled push cut

Roy talked about foot design

- -bowl foot is a 5:3 ratio (the foot the smaller portion)
- -platter foot is a 50:50 ratio (Roy measured and drew a line to demo)

Mortise: vital to check the outside angle of your chuck jaws (his Vicmark jaws are at  $70^{\circ}$ )

- -Roy used a sharp square scraper to make a 2mm mortise
- -He used his skew to set the inside angle (the angle he said is based on the effective cutting angle discovered in the development of the French guillotine!)

Roy then refine the Roman ogee shape which is defined as having 2 curves


-He demonstrated raising the tool rest and dropping the handle to the point of using the wings of the bowl gouge like a skew

Sanding: Roy sands his platters using mineral oil










- -He started at 150 dipping his sandpaper in the oil resulting in a constant slurry
- -He then did the same with 220 and 320
- -Wet sanding, besides cutting down on dust, also can be done at higher speed (he sanded at 650rpm)
- \*Top of platter\*

Chuck tip: don't use chuck key as lever to remove chuck-can distort the body

Reverse piece and place in chuck

-use tailstock  $\mathbf{w}/\mathbf{o}$  livecenter to press piece into chuck (he often uses a golf ball)

Roy used pull cuts to face the piece



- -He used the skew also on the front to define the thickness of the rim of the platter
- -Roy constantly moved the tool rest for optimal support to prevent vibration
- -He also carefully cut out to the rim bead with the lathe in reverse explaining that this allowed for much greater control

Roy completed the rest of the inside of the platter with bowl cuts (using his 50° and 70° bowl gouges and his heavy scraper)

Thank you Roy for sharing your well thought out presentation! There are techniques shown that I think I'd have to dedicate serious time to learning to feel confident in employing, but they seem well worth the effort! Much appreciated.

• Recommended **interior** dimensions for turned boxes are: 6" diameter (5" min.), 5"

height (4" min.)

- Lids for Beads of Courage boxes should be easy for small or ill children to remove or lift
- Wood choice should not have voids, inclusions or cracks in them

There are many hand tools, lathe tools, clamps, routers, handheld power tools of all sorts. Here are a few pictures:







Chain Sharpening Service from Jeff Zens: I have an electric chain sharpener and can accurately sharpen your chains and adjust depth stops for your saw chains. This service will restore the chain to "factory-new" condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00 Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is only available for club members.
