July Presenter: Eric Lofstrom

Working with wood has been a source of peaceful intrigue since my childhood. When creating, I try to practice "presence," or mindfulness, so I can stay safe and make the most of my time creatively. I strive to balance the seemingly opposite goals of absolute physical control and creative surrender. On my best days, I can zoom in on the finest material details, while also acknowledging how various elements might play to a piece's artistic message. Approaching studio time in this way may not be

the most productive in terms of volume, but it allows me to explore and fully

understand things in a more satisfying way.

As an artist, I aim to create clean-lined forms with minimal distraction. I use grain, color, and texture to invite an intimate conversation with my work. I enjoy working within self-prescribed constraints, focusing my exploration to develop philosophical concepts into series. Currently, my work represents curiosities relating to water, energy, and the human spirit.

Turning an Artistic End Grain Bowl: "Namaste" Series In this session, you will learn many of the techniques I use to create artistic, yet functional bowls using small end grain pieces of wood. Emphasis will be on tools control, techniques specific to turning end grain and discussion of form. We will also explore multiple elegant coloring & texturing embellishments I use to add depth & drama to a captivatingly simple form. After this session, you'll see any small block of plain-grained wood as a potential piece of art!

Saturday (7/15) Class Topic: Skew Skills

Skew Skills: "Making the Cuts!" In this session, you learn basic spindle turning with the skew, simple sharpening techniques used to create a razor's edge & methods to obtain an ultra-clean cut. You will experience several exercises using biomechanics to increase tool control & gain confidence at the lathe. This session will also showcase skill-building projects; the egg & my version of the finger-tip spinning top. The experience of using the skew & the lessons learned during this demo will expand your success with ALL cutting tools!

Sunday (7/16) Class Topic: Creating Characters- Make a Viking Gnome

Turning a Viking Gnome: Creating Characters Using basic spindle turning tools, this session focuses on spindle grain turning to create a small, character-filled viking. In addition to reviewing basic tool applications, attendees will learn techniques used to join multiple complementary forms to compose a unique figurine. This session will showcase what basic tools and simple embellishment techniques will allow you to do with a handful of spindle grain wood blanks. Once you learn to turn a viking, you'll be able to apply the basics to create a unique character of your own!

June Sawdust Session: Well, about 18 folks spent a few hours on again, quite a variety of projects from pens to bowls. We had a couple first time turners and others just honing their skills. The strangest? Roger's bone dry root wad. What a challenge he took on!





































June meeting notes:


President **Marc Vickery** gavelled the meeting to order at 6:30 with an attendance of 46 people and led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Marc announced and thanked Kip Allen for stepping up to coordinate our booth at the State Fair.

Elling took the group through the pieces on display for Show-n-Tell including the sign mentioned by Marc in his note above! Well done.



Gary Dahrens revisited the idea of a monthly "challenge" project. The



including piercing, coloring, texturing, and burning, and finally, a round tuit. The group was amiable to the suggestion and the project agreed to for July was a **spinning top**. VP Larry shared the latest on our upcoming visit and classes from Eric Lofstrom including costs, locations, topics, and openings. (see note from Marc above)

Presenter: Nick Stagg

Nick shared a bit of his turning history leading to his expertise in sharpening. He started turning in 2002 and in 2005 hosted a 2-day Stuart Batty class at his place. During this time, he got extra individual lessons on sharpening from Stuart which became the basis for most of his technique and demonstrations. Some points I took from the demo:







- -The negative rake scraper is not a scraper but a finishing cutting tool that allows for much less sanding required.
- *The 40-40 grind is not his go to for finishing cuts (not sure if I heard that right...)
- -Advice: plan for 2 final cuts; only make one
- -Nick said he's found that a sharp tool only stays sharp for 2 minutes of actual clean cutting before needing to be touched up.
- -Grind the heel of the gouge for better inside cuts.
- -The steps to grinding a gouge is wing, wing, sweep the middle, meaning focus on both wings before a final wing to wing pass.
- -Nick's bottom gouge technique was the same but with a flatter 50° platform angle. -His spindle gouge also uses the 40-40 grind but without as much wrist (rotation).
- -The roughing gouge has no swing and is just rotation to keep a flat profile.
- *To do this, Nick puts both thumbs on the edges of the roughing gouge and just rolls from thumb to thumb.
- -Don't over rotate the gouge; this makes the wing edge very difficult or impossible to access.



- -Be very careful not to create a "bird's beak" wing which is difficult, impossible, or even dangerous to use.
- -When reshaping a tool upside down on the grinder, make sure to rock forward and back to avoid the concave wing.
- -Nick uses a 320 grit wheel for his fine grind.
- *He uses a leather strop to remove the burr on his skew.
- -Nick sets his platform at 20° for his skew using the multi-gauge from Stuart Batty. He acknowledged that this results in a <u>slightly</u> concave bevel which has little to no impact to his cutting in his
- *He did say removing this with a few passes on a diamond sharpening stone would work.
- -He prefers the angle gauge over the other angle tools as there are fewer variables including shrinking wheels, settings from other users, and vibration issues.

experience.

- **Nick then demonstrated some cutting and gave us some other pointers.
- -He does not recommend the use of collars in assisting us in tool rest height. Each tool requires a slightly different height which is also affected by the tool overhang on the rest.
- -He reviewed body position and the role of the hands
- (left hand just positions and weights the tool to deal with vibration; all steering comes from the right hand).
- -Finally, Nick's favorite sandpaper grit is silicone carbide.
- Thank you Nick! I've got many years of refining before coming close to what you achieve with your edges. Torn grain will be my life until then...
- A great raffle once again! Thank you donors and ticket buyers. Meeting adjourned at 8:30.

Thank you Jack Knight!



Chain Sharpening Service from Jeff Zens: I have an electric chain sharpener and can accurately sharpen your chains and adjust depth stops for your saw chains. This service will

restore the chain to "factory-new" condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00 Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is only available for club members.
