#### July President's Message:

Hello Willamette Valley Woodturners,

As many of you recently experienced, the Covid bug has not gone away. At our last meeting, someone came in who was highly contagious with the most recent version of the bug. With the meeting on Thursday evening, people who came down with it were not well

by Saturday. That's extremely quick.

It was also very virulent and many were quite ill from it. In fact, I was made aware that at least two folks sought help at the hospital.

I was surprised when it was reported that four folks who attended the meeting tested positive. I sent out the membership wide notification and received many responses that others had become ill with either the Covid bug or something just like it. All together I know of at least 15 folks who were infected, some of whom were spouses and related members of a household who did not attend. But not everyone replied so I am sure there are many more.

I was talking to my physician about why some folks might not have any outward signs and part of that might just be timing. If someone has a virulent case and passes it to another, but that person isn't feeling it yet, they may be a carrier who is contagious but not symptomatic, YET...

I asked my physician if there was any way to report this to the CDC as a mass exposure. I was informed they are not taking the info anymore. The very next day I heard on the news that the CDC reported a high increase of admissions to hospitals and other care centers due to Covid 19.

Go figure.

For my own part, I did not get it this time. This was quite lucky for the 35 people I went to a birthday party with on the Saturday after the meeting, especially for our 91 year old grandma. Could have been the end for her. If I had a clue how bad this was, I would have locked myself in a cave.

In checking with my physician, it was recommended that I get an updated booster. This bug will continue to mutate and there is no one vaccine that does it all. Getting a case of it immunizes a person to that particular version but not necessarily subsequent versions. I got boosted. It was easy.

In looking forward, I wish I could say there is a protocol for our club meetings. I certainly do not want us to stop meeting. I certainly don't think we need to go backwards in time and start Zooming all the meetings and everyone start wearing masks.

I do wish I could stop everyone at the door to ask if they are truly feeling OK enough to be in a large group in an enclosed room. Or have they been exposed to someone who is or may be ill.

Since that seems impractical, I will ask people to really make that assessment themselves. Don't come if you are not well. And if you have been around someone who is not well, YOU may be a carrier and contagious. Be aware of who you are around.

What did I learn?

- This Covid thing has not gone away.
- This Covid thing can reappear in its worst form the next time you have a conversation with someone.
- A carrier may not even know they are a carrier.
- Get a current vaccine even if you just got the Covid bug, as soon as the doctor says it's safe to do so.
- And if you have the slightest hint of a bug or are exposed to someone who is, wear a mask to protect

others!

On to more pleasant things.

The **Benton County Fair** was this weekend and all I can say is that Brian Skaar did a super job of getting the Willamette Valley Woodturners represented in a great new venue. I was only there for 5 hours (scheduled for 3, had too much fun, and stayed for more). Brian set up a great booth with two lathes and both were running full tilt.

# **Presenter: Eric Lofstrom-Viking Gnome**

Eric's website is incredibly rich in content including items, thoughtful discussion and essays, and step-by-step project instructions! Amazingly generous. Do visit!

Eric describes the inspiration and birth of his version of the Viking Gnomes which started back in the winter of '22-'23 as he was snowed in at his place on the Olympic Peninsula in Washington. Creditting Rebecca DeGroot for her works, he decided to work up his own characters! As he was also

working on his house he shared some pictures of Viking Gnomes wielding paint rollers (see pics in PDF link below). Precise and masterful while also incredibly cute!

The above link will take you to the instructions Eric told us he had for us to use. They mirror his presentation and are way more detailed than I could describe in these notes.

I will instead try to list some take-aways I got that are not in his notes (including numerous opinions...). \*Eric's background is in kinesthetics, the study of movement, and he brought this prominently into his presentation. Feet, legs, arms, body, all work in concert to make the best cuts possible.

\*Eric is amazing with the skew and prefers to do the vast majority of his gnome with this tool. However, he understood his audience's mild aversion to the tool and so did most of the project with a spindle gouge.







\*He spent a bit of time on his sharpening technique saying he goes from CBN wheel, to diamond card "hone", to leather strop. Sharp!

\*He used his whole body and the flat portion of his skew to peel cut the cherry body in seconds! (Had to pick up my jaw after seeing that...) \*Eric talked about the Jacobs chuck and some of the considerations for using. He said it's important to periodically clean the Morse taper surfaces for a solid, secure connection. Even so, Eric suggests, and demonstrated, holding the chuck to prevent it moving. He also reminded us of the importance of clearing the drill often and told the disaster story (not his) of a Forstner bit getting stuck and ripping things up...

\*He often chokes way up on his tools with his right hand at the collet and the handle under his arm either clamped to his body or braced along his forearm.

\*He uses a red pencil. (Was easy to see!)

\*Eric uses collets often including on his drill bits, tool rest post, and grinder cradles. \*He reminded us to slow way down at the end of a cut-off cut to prevent any torn fibers.

\*He also reminded us to grind off the heel of tools that do any concave cuts to prevent burnishing.

\*Eric used a countersink bit to clean the fuzzy edges of his drilled hole.

\*He likes his battery powered micro-motor rotary carving tool saying the battery lasts some 10 hours and it's quiet (I didn't think it was on at first...). He uses this for texturing many parts of his gnomes.

\*The color is first India ink, and then Rub'nBuff pewter (metal) wax. He wears



organized presentation! Friendly, funny, and so very skilled. It made me sorry I hadn't signed up for a class. But then I found out there were openings on Friday and I really wanted help with end-grain hollowing and I jumped at the chance



(see review below). Thank you very much, Eric! I look forward to another visit!

**Gallery**: As I mentioned, there was a great collection of items brought in! In the short time left, Elling pointed out a few including Dick's epoxy piece, Gary's tops, Mark's first bowls!, Marc's giant live edge bowl, and his crazily warped eucalyptus bowl and burl/epoxy sphere (which glows!). #### Namaste Bowls with Eric Lofstrom: My experience and two cents...

As I mentioned above, I was able to jump in to the Friday class with Eric which I was excited to do as I have struggled with endgrain hollowing over the years. Larry's sign-up showed folks signed up and then crossed out and then others signed up. My two cents is that we as a club may need to do pay in advance for our classes. Larry said a few folks just didn't show and we kind of took a beating financially as a club. This on top of spots taken and not used when folks that would have liked to have been there didn't think there was a spot. Live and learn I guess...

However, this section is on the greatness that was Friday!

It was a beautiful day and we got to be outside for some painting and lunch. There were four of us students and we were all at different levels, but Eric was able to take each of us where we were, and move us along fine.

Eric demonstrated the process to the point where the finishes were to be applied and then taught us the finer techniques of both sharpening (making a "hook" rather than a burr on a scraper results in an endgrain cut that needs no sanding...) and tool control. Fantastic. I got a few catches but then caught on and was loving the hollowing for the first time ever. We each made two bowls.

After that, we went through the steps of coloration which involved a non-wax clear shellac, a non-wax spray on white shellac, and then two acrylic paint effects. Both were beautiful!

He then showed the steps for making a jam chuck to finish the bottom, but we'd run out of time to actually finish our own.

He wrapped up with a review of the day and steps and how much he enjoyed sharing his art with us. And this was well over an hour past the scheduled end time! He's an exceptional human.

**Bylaw changes:** With our growing club, we are proposing that we split out some of the duties the past Treasurer did and make it a new board position. In order to keep the same number of board members, the at-large positions will be reduced from two to one. The following underlined section is the definition of the position to be discussed and voted on by the members:

6. Membership Director: The Membership Director is generally responsible for all Club matters that relate to developing and retaining members of the Club, and all activities involved with accurate membership record-keeping. To the extent that membership duties might involve financial transactions, the Membership

Director and the Club Treasurer will work closely to ensure that the duties of each position are accomplished. The particular duties of the Membership director are generally defined in Appendix A of these bylaws, and this Appendix may be periodically modified by the Board in its administrative role.

#### APPENDIX A

#### Duties of the Willamette Valley Woodturners Membership Director

The WVW Board of Directors confers latitude on how the following important tasks are accomplished. Major changes in any of the tasks, or the technology used to complete them must first be approved by the Board. The Membership Director is encouraged to develop ideas and practices that increase Club membership. Where Board action or approval would help reach this goal, it should be obtained. This document is meant to provide an overview of the position, but might not include every task. It may be revised from time to time by the Board without a vote of the membership.

- 1. Attend and participate in Board meetings as scheduled by the Club President (generally quarterly).
- 2. Working with the Club's Board of Directors, develop ideas and programs to add new members to the Club and to maintain interest of existing members.
- 3. As needed, obtain assistance from the Club's membership to complete the tasks and perform the duties described in this document.
- 4. Keep the **WVW Picture Roster up to date** and accurate, with current member contact information. At least annually, purge inactive members from the **WVW Picture Roster**, and notify the Club Webmaster via email or hard copy of these deletions. Save the **WVW Picture Roster** in its original format and export a PDF copy which is automatically linked to the Club's website.
- 5. Keep the official Excel spreadsheet Club Membership Roster up to date and accurate with 'Paid/Not paid/New/Departed' members. This document is stored in Dropbox and is available to officers and others who need it in a "Read-Only" format. The Membership Director is the Primary editor and keeper of this file. An email list in the Club Membership Roster must also be kept up-to-date for Club-wide email message distribution.
- 6. Send out Welcome messages to new members.
- 7. Notify the Webmaster with new member information required to establish website login credentials.
- 8. **Print name tags** for existing members as they pay their annual dues. New name tags for every Club member are required annually, and shall be printed on stock of a different color than the previous year.
- 9. **Remind members** who have not paid their dues (by e-mail). (This is a current requirement which will disappear with the new website),
- 10. Send flowers to possibly abruptly departed member's spouses.
- 11. Receive new membership forms from various sources, and using the information from the forms,
  - Create new entries in the Club membership spreadsheet (currently an Excel document, stored in Dropbox.) See #1, above.
  - Print new membership nametags, and distribute these to new members at the next Club meeting.
  - Photograph new members.
  - Create entries for new members in the club Picture Roster, and save this in proper formats linked to the Club's website.
  - Refine and implement mechanism for New Member Orientation to the Club.
  - Retain signed Parental Consent forms for Associate Members until they reach the age of majority. At the end of that calendar year, notify the Associate Member and the parent who authorized membership that the Associate Membership has lapsed and Adult membership is now required.

12. Coordinate and communicate with the Club Treasurer on any financial matter concerning membership.

13. Issue hard-copy cash receipts for all cash transactions, in accordance with current Club cash-handling procedures.

  - Both will be brought to demo for testing

This service will restore the chain to "factory-new" condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00 Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is <u>only</u> available for club members.
