

May Meeting Notes:

VP Kip gavelled the meeting to order at 6:30 followed by a recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. 47 people were on hand for the show.

Darcy announced that the June Sawdust Session would be held two weeks early due to Father's Day and his being gone. Thus it has already taken place as of this writing... July's will fall on its normal Sunday following the Thursday meeting (unless preempted...).

Jeff shared that the Craft Supplies order was at \$465 (\$700 as of this writing).

Kip addressed the concern about the 50+ Center news that could possibly affect our meeting location. The news was that there was no news. No change will be happening.

-Kip also shared he has too many Vicmarc chucks and is selling a few. Contact him if interested.

Walt brought a range of tools from member Don Waddsworth to sell with proceeds going to the club. Walt probably still has some if interested.

Randy announced that he had a collection of maple at his place up for grabs (as well as other species) and members were welcome to come by on Sat. the 11th starting at 9 AM. (See pics below)

Terry announced that the plan was for John Beaver to run two days of classes at his shop after his August demo. Class size would be capped at 6 per day with price TBD.



Presenter Rick Rich-Spindle turnings

Rick covered a lot of topics and skills and moved right along. The following are the notes I was able to capture, but I'm sure they're not complete!

-Rick shared that he very much likes using the skew, but it does indeed take dedicated practice to get proficient with. He said it's well worth it

though!

-He shared that he is always a bit nervous when starting a demo so warms up with a little project that utilizes the main skew cuts: peel, plane, v, and bead. He then made a little snowman...

-His **2nd turning** was from a book called *A Course in Woodturning* published in 1919 (Here is just one online version I found

https://www.loc.gov/resource/gdcmassbookdig.courseinwoodturn00milt/?st=gallery).

-Rick likes to use the skew high on the spindle and so places his tool rest quite high.

-To make an even 1 ½" cylinder, he used calipers (round the tips

well) and a parting tool at 5 locations and then used a planing cut to the bottom of these.

-Rick said if you find the skew bouncing a bit, put more weight on the tool rest.

-He then used a story stick to make marks to match the low and high points found on the pattern.

-Rick started with the bead in the center using v cuts to define.

- -The pattern ends were made with a peeling cut and the coves with a spindle gouge.
- -Rick talked a bit about the skew he uses preferring the curved edge version, but said that whatever you like will work.
- -He likes this project for its symmetry. It takes a lot of tweaks to get to symmetry, but fewer with practice.
- -Rick's **3rd turning** was stool leg from a 1907 book called *Elementary Turning*, a book of 62 lessons for shop teachers! (https://www.loc.gov/resource/gdcmassbookdig.elementaryturnin00seld/?st=gallery)

- -This project keeps the square top part.
- -Rick started with a v cut at the shoulder and then planed a cylinder.
- -Again, he used a story stick, calipers, and parting tool to set the diameters.
- -Rick first cut the cove with his spindle gouge and then used the skew to blend into that cove.
- -His **4th turning** was a rolling pin. It is a smaller version that he has found people appreciate.
- -Rick started with a 13 ½" by 2 ½" spindle between centers, this time roughing it to a cylinder with a roughing gouge.
- -He used the skew to make peeling cuts for the handles and then used the long point end of the skew to make clean endgrain cuts.
- -The cove was cut with the spindle gouge and the skew to blend



the handle beads to the cove.

- -Rick tapers the barrel of the roller 1/16" from center to each end.
- -Rick's **5th turning** was a garden dibbler (AKA dibber or dibble). It's a tool to make holes for seeds and bulbs at specific depths.
- -His stock for the dibbler was 10" by 1 ½" which he loves as you can just crank these out from 2 by material!
- -Rick showed roughing using a long point push cut with the skew.
- -The cove for the handle is gradual enough that he was able to make it with the short point of the skew. The grip and 1" depth markings are v cuts using the long point.
- -To show the usefulness of the skew once you get proficient with it, Rick made a 2nd

dibbler in about 2 minutes... Ha!

The two locations that I worked at were well staffed. It was enjoyable to meet folks from other parts of the country who were interested in attending the **OWS**!"












Chain Sharpening Service from Jeff Zens: I have an electric chain sharpener and can accurately sharpen your chains and adjust depth stops for your saw chains. This service will restore the chain to "factory-new" condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00 Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is <u>only</u> available for club members.
