Matt Monaco operates a full-time woodturning studio in the Ozark region of Missouri, and is one of the only full-time modern traditional woodturners in America having trained & apprenticed within the handmade trade landscape as a working professional — Working closely within the high-end professional furniture production,



Shackleton Thomas Furniture & Pottery as full-time in house wood turner; which preceded a time period of training, and skill development while earning a living as a full-time item producer within both the wholesale tradeshow, and retail circuit.

At center of Matt's work is his understanding & mastery of tool control, sharpening and cutting execution as an expression of traditionally crafted design as fine art -- in producing forms & items that are made to be as tactile as they are sublime, and created with intent & purpose. Matt is also a Fine Woodworking Contributor & Ambassador who values both the integrity of traditional woodturning and its mastery as an art, as well as diversity



within the handmade and woodworking craft idiom.

And thanks much to Jeff and Dick for being so on top of all things membership and money!!) and shopping tools from Jimmie's excellent selection, the meeting got started early at 6:00 with 59 folks in attendance. President Larry led the group in



the Pledge of Allegiance followed by announcements.

\*a construction company in Brownsville is renovating an old house and had need of about a dozen 18" turned balusters. Larry got a hand raised showing interest in the job. *(editor's note: I would love to get an article and some pics of the project. Can be just a quick note or a longer narrative.)* 

\*Larry reminded folks that the OWS is coming up and we're still in need of volunteers and to contact him or Mark Choitz. *(Thank you to those that signed up!)* Shifts can be short or long and done by registered or non-registered folk. *(See note below)* 

**Marc V:** Empty Bowls was a giant success again raising just over \$37,000! WVW's bowls, which sold out by 2 PM, raised \$1700 and Marc's bowl raised \$500 in the raffle meaning WVW's portion was \$2200 of the total. Thank you all who contributed bowls to the effort! *(See the next opportunity below in the OWS note)* 

**VP Kip** announced that the January presenter, Matt Monaco, would be doing 3 days of classes at the super low price of \$35 per day (or \$100 for all three). The signup list was quite full by evening's end! (*And is full as of this writing. Well done! A class is an excellent way to advance your skills for sure! If someone drops between now and the meeting, spots may open up. Be* 

ready!)

### **Presenter: Jimmie Allen**

Jimmie was with us 13 months ago and presented box making at that time as well. I was inspired again, marvelling at

the way his tools work, his skill in making and using the tools, and his fine crafting of beautiful boxes! Some notes:



Above: Jimmie glues his piece to a waste block with a threaded insert that mounts on a screw chuck. By using this he can take the piece off and remount it in the exact same place. Jimmie explained the 3 main tools he'd be using were the point tool, square end, and half round scrapers. All his negative rake scrapers are ground at 20° on top and 70° on bottom which he has found supports the burr most effectively. *(He eventually used more than 3... Ha!)*Below: Jimmie throwing crazy long maple ribbons truing up the end; cutting the shoulder (tenon); cutting the initial bead at the edge of the tenon-lathe rpm? 3128...



Above: rounding the body of the base into the bead with a skew used as a negative rake scraper; beginning to hollow with a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" half round scraper; touching up the burr on 80 grit wheel (after feeling how large his burr was compared to mine, I asked what I was doing wrong. I was told to push into the the wheel harder-worked!) Below: rounding the body more; not shown is more hollowing using a double ended <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" half round scraper running the lathe in reverse to use other end; middle pic shows box base on waste block and lid on lathe being marked using calipers for mortise; shaping the lid



Above: Jimmie like the coved lid for the way it looks and feels; 3rd pic-Jimmie explained the bead on the edge of the top needs to be slightly smaller that the base bead-even if equal it can look top heavy Below: more shaping of top and eventual parting off (after making sure the sides of the mortise are straight as possible); note how Jimmie wraps his pointer finger under his tool rest-likes this for control





Above: base back on lathe to refine shape; to make a vacuum fit slightly round the tenon (Jimmie's got a tad small so need a paper towel to make it tight

Below: Jimmie uses a spent sanding mandrel (hook and loop material gone) as a rotating jam chuck fitting it into a live center with a removable tip; refining the top



Above: refining, refining; to finalize top Jimmie added some tape to the joint for extra security-he used a spindle gouge for final cuts

Below: sharpen beading tool flute up (cut with flutes down); after parting base off (do not part off all the way as it will

result in torn grain-saw the last 1/8"), Jimmie made a jam chuck fo finish the bottom of the base



Below: Jimmie refined the base, took it off the jam chuck, looked at project with the lid on, and then put base back on jam chuck for a bit more refining; Jimmie answering questions at the after meeting meeting-always a sign of a good demo!



Thanks again for the visit Jimmie!

Meeting adjourned about 8:20 after the raffle. (*Thanks all who brought in raffle items this month! Great contribution! And thanks all who helped clean up! Makes it go much faster.*)

### December Sawdust Session:

About 20 folks participated in the turning opportunity in December. Stephen brought in a monster piece of wood and really learned a ton from Darcy and others about turning large items (including how to save them when you go through the bottom!). We had a couple first ever bowls worked on, Terry got after a platter, and some fun spindle work was done by our youngest turner!



**Chain Sharpening Service** from Jeff Zens: I have an electric chain sharpener and can accurately sharpen your chains and adjust depth stops for your saw chains. This service will restore the chain to "factory-new" condition. Most chains for 18" and shorter bars can be sharpened for \$10.00. Longer chains (up to 30" bars) are \$20.00 Badly damaged chains might be a little bit more. I will also tell you if the chain has reached the end of its useful life, and will not sharpen a chain beyond that point. This price is <u>only</u> available for club members.
